Each of these methods harnesses psycholinguistics principles that mirror the mechanisms of first language acquisition and the learning of subsequent languages—whether they be second or third languages (Mousa & Ali, 2023: 1). Furthermore, they delve into aspects of English language perception, which encompasses both listening and reading, as well as language production, which includes speaking and writing (Mousa & Ali, 2023: 2). Collectively, these four skills—listening, reading, speaking, and writing—constitute the core competencies of language mastery. Psycholinguistics offers a wealth of theories that illuminate the intricate processes involved in language acquisition, production, and perception—encompassing both spoken and written forms. These theories have found valuable applications in the realm of English language education, where educators often draw upon them as foundational principles for developing effective teaching methodologies. This approach, known as the psycholinguistics approach, perceives learning as a cognitive process that originates within the individual before transitioning into a broader social context.
